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Nursing Manual Handling

Manual handling injuries occur not only through incorrect lifting techniques and inappropriate moving and lifting, but also through poor posture, prolonged standing, twisting, bending and stretching (Kay & Glass 2011).

Manual handling of patients has been a continuous issue of safety among nurses. In fact, the Department of Health(2007) has called for an end in the manual handling of patients due to the injury that it has caused among nurses.

Patient manual handling should only continue in cases which do not involve lifting most or all of a patient's weight. This rules out for example, the shoulder or Australian lift. The Health and Safety Executive advise a balanced approach to managing the risks from patient handling.

In 2014, nursing homes were deemed to be among the most dangerous workplaces in the United States according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, with a rate of 7.1 recordable cases per 100 FTEs.3 Heavy manual handling is a key risk factor for work-related musculoskeletal disorders of the back, neck, and upper extremities and nursing homes rank among the top five industries for compensable injuries and disorders of this type.
