Federal Law Establishes Formal Special Education Process. Federal lawmakers responded to these court rulings by establishing a process for identifying and serving children with disabilities. Enacted in 1975, the federal law now known as the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) set forth a three-step process (Figure 1). IDEA authorizes federal funding to all states agreeing to implement this process.
