The rood screen (also choir screen, chancel screen, or jubé) is a common feature in late medieval church architecture. It is typically an ornate partition between the chancel and nave, of more or less open tracery constructed of wood, stone, or wrought iron. The rood screen would originally have been surmounted by a rood loft carrying the Great Rood, a sculptural representation of the Crucifixion.

Today just 24 substantially complete medieval rood lofts survive in Britain, with 13 of these being in Wales. But what is such a beautiful and complex screen doing in a small wayside church in the middle of nowhere? The screen is very similar in design and construction to that of the church in Llanegryn, Gwynedd.

The medieval 'great rood' was a carved and painted crucifix, erected on a pedestal above the rood screen. It had the figures of the Blessed Virgin Mary and St John the Evangelist on either side of Jesus on the cross. Rood loft. Many

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medieval churches had a rood loft, or singing gallery, on top of the rood screen. It was often supported by a coving.

In the medieval church the parish mass had been sung by the priest at the high altar in the chancel whilst the people gathered in the nave on the west side of the screen. Incidentally, this is an arrangement very familiar to most older Anglicans since the Victorians restored it
